The Missioner

From the Desk of the Chaplain

For I am not ashamed of the gospel; it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who has faith, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. For in it the righteousness of God is revealed through faith for faith; as it is written, 'The one who is righteous will live by faith.' Romans 1:16,17

“[Romans] is the fullest, plainest and grandest statement of the gospel in the New Testament.” John Stott

Every three years, our *Book of Common Prayer* assigns sixteen major passages from Paul’s *Letter to the Romans* to be read during Sunday worship. The result is that anyone who regularly attends worship in an Episcopal Church will be exposed every third year to this ‘premier document of Christian theology’ (Eugene Peterson).

Following the lead of the prayer book, Deacon Linda and I plan to preach through these major passages in *Romans* over the coming summer months. Typically, our preaching centers on the gospel reading for the day, with references to the Old Testament and epistle readings. But these uninterrupted months of the Pentecost season afford us all the opportunity to focus on the public reading and preaching of this entire epistle. Just as Dostoyevsky intended *The Brothers Karamazov* to be read from front to back, Paul intended his letter to be heard and studied as a whole document. Could you understand, let alone enjoy, *The Brothers Karamazov* if you only read isolated paragraphs in no particular order?

Romans has an impressive history of realigning lives. Augustine of Hippo, Martin Luther, and John Wesley all attributed their conversions to reading *Romans*. It’s not light reading. Paul is a heavyweight thinker -- the greatest Christian theologian ever. But for those willing to open their ears and hearts, *Romans* serves an antidote to shallow thinking about God. As a chiropractor read-justs a twisted spine, *Romans* may help to center our lives on God. Paul is thoroughly centered on God: God’s truth, God’s salvation, God’s justification, God’s righteousness, God’s gospel, God’s promises.

So Deacon Linda and I invite you to read Paul’s *Letter to the Romans* with us this summer. If you’re interested in a deeper study, we will be using N.T. Wright’s *Paul for Everyone: Romans* and John Stott’s *The Message of Romans* as references. We intend these sermons to build one upon the other just as Paul builds his defense of the Christian gospel one chapter at a time. Our goal is to give Paul a fresh hearing, to let him speak for himself. As we prepare to preach, we will ask God to speak to us and to the congregation of St. Alban’s in the same way He first spoke to the apostle Paul. We hope you will want to join us in this adventure.

Divine Mercy Project Update

Thank you from Uganda!

A couple of weeks ago I had the great joy of opening a package from Uganda to find a letter from every child who received a goat this winter -- Christmas gifts from parishioners and friends of St. Alban’s and the children of Trinity School. They are beautiful letters, and we look forward to sharing them with you.

The Divine Mercy Project this year has enabled 60 children to attend school by funding their uniforms, books, and fees (a total cost of about \$101 per child). The children’s families, mostly headed by women widowed in the Rwandan genocide, each received seed for planting corps and a female goat. They also received training in good methods of farming and goat-keeping. (The goat and crop component of the project cost about \$105 per child.) The project is directed by the Rev. Jack Katarishangwa, an Anglican priest and a long-time friend of ours from semi-nary. With the combined gifts of 61 goats from St. Alban’s and 45 from Trinity Episcopal Day School, the project has also been able to bring in another 46 children for the coming school year. The crops are growing well and so are the goats!

More pictures and letters are in store, but here is a sampling:

Dear my friends in America,

I send you my love and greetings in the Name of Jesus through this letter. Thank you for loving me this much. I am called Patience Tukundane. I am in primary five. I live with my grand mother. I love play ing netball with my friends. I am so grateful for the money you sent to me to buy a goat. My goat is very beautiful. I know one day she will give me a kid because it is grow ing so fast. I am always praying for you. You also pray for me so that I study well. I wish you God’s blessings. I am Patience Tukundane.

Dear my friends in America,

Praise God my friends! My name is Jacob Mwiine. I am in primary six. I study Maths, English, Science and Social Studies. My best subject is Maths. I want to work in a bank when I grow up. Thank you very much for the goat you bought for me. My goat is very beautiful. I love taking her in the hills to graze. My mother loves you. We always pray for you. God bless you. I am your son, Jacob Mwiine.

Dear my friends in America,

How is America? I am called Agnes Kiconco. I am in primary seven. I love reading the Bible. I go to church on Sundays. Thank you very much for the goat you sent to me. I was very happy. My father too loved the goat. We are now at school. I love singing at school. I am in school choir. My choir master is good. He teaches us very well. I want to do music when I grow up. Pray for me so that God gives me the power and knowledge. Greet for me all members of your c hurch. My father and I love you so much. We are always praying for you. I am your daughter, Agnes Kiconco.

Thank you for honoring our Lord with your gifts to these children.
